


















PROBLEMS IN CONNECTION WITH SLUM CLEARANCE IN PUERTO RICO
With Special Reference to the San Juan Area

One of the most acute problems facing the Island of Puerto Rico as a whole and San Juan in particular is the accelerated and steady growth of slums. While the economic problems of the Island may to a large degree be responsible for the creation of slums and consequently an improvement of economic conditions is necessary before the slum problem can be solved, yet it is an apparent fact that some concerted effort, sponsored by Government authority, must be made along the line of slum clearance, based upon an accurate study of influencing circumstances and with long range planning.

With the pressure of Island population, which will shortly reach two million persons in an already over-crowded country, suffering the ill effects of economic depression and the consequent acceptance of low social standards, it is not surprising that the low-income group is satisfied to seek improvised shelter. With the prevailing high rental rates in San Juan, Santurce, as well as other cities in the Island, there is no alternative for these poor people but to look to the swamps around the bay and lagoons of San Juan or on the outskirts of other cities as a place to build their humble shacks.

Detailed surveys made by the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration in the San Juan and Santurce areas show that a large percentage of those living in slum areas pay no rent whatsoever. Many of the slum dwellers are squatters who, without authority and with no respect for existing legislation, have built their poor and inadequate shacks upon swamp land owned by the Municipal or Insular Government. In other slum areas the land is owned by private persons who lease plots on a "ground rent" basis, upon which the slum

dweller builds a shack to which he has, under Puerto Rican law, a degree of title.

It is true that there are sufficient laws and sanitary regulations to permit the Insular and Municipal authorities to wipe out all slum areas if such laws were enforced. The practical problem arises, however, as to what would become of the thousands of families thus dispossessed. So far there has been no disposition to take such drastic steps.

It must be pointed out also that there is a difference in Puerto Rico between slums and so-called sub-standard houses. In addition to strictly slum areas which will be treated in this report, there are yet thousands of families, especially in San Juan, who are living under terribly congested conditions. Usually, however, these are families who can afford to pay a higher rental than families living in strictly slum areas and consequently the solution of their problem should be based upon a different program.

NUMBER OF SLUM DWELLERS

No accurate Island-wide study has ever been made of the number of persons living in slum areas in the seventy-six municipalities of Puerto Rico. Slums in and around San Juan are increasing so rapidly that even the most detailed survey is inaccurate after a few years. Surveys made by the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration in 1936 showed that in San Juan and Santurce there were at that time thirteen slum areas as follows:

Since that time, however, these slums have increased in size in some of the areas by as much as fifty percent. A recent survey showed that the above-mentioned areas now contain 11,420 families, or an approximate increase of twenty-five percent over the 1936 study.	
Accompanying this report is an aerial map showing the slum areas in San Juan and Santurce. Special attention should be called to the "Miranda" slum overlooking the San Juan Bay and "La Perla" on the Atlantic Ocean adjacent to historic "El Morro" and the United States Army Post. Many soldiers attached to the 65th Regiment live with their families in this latter slum area. All of the other slums shown on this aerial map, with the exception of the "Mosquito" slum which lies east of Martín Peña Bridge, are located in places which are not often seen by the casual visitor. This, however, does not lessen their seriousness. Perhaps special mention should be made of the "Mosquito" slum as one of the worst in the entire San Juan-Santurce district.	
Slum areas exist in every town in the Island and the proportion to total population is higher in other towns than in the San Juan-Santurce area. Mayagüez, second largest city in the Island, has a serious slum problem. In

clers, servants, dock and factory workers. Any abrupt change in their location would bring about considerable hardship. Therefore, it would seem that problem number one in the slum clearance program is to analyze each area in the light of where the families are to be moved, if they are moved at all.

The second factor to be considered is the type of housing project to be undertaken.

It is obvious that the first consideration must be to provide living quarters where the rentals will be as low as possible. Some indication of the rentals that can be paid by families now living in slum areas can be drawn by considering the table below which shows the income of all families living in the "La Perla" slum, based upon a house to house survey made by the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration in 1936:

Similar surveys were made at the same time in several of the larger slum areas in San Juan and Santurce, as well as in Ponce and Mayaguez. More detailed information on these surveys is shown in Appendix "A". The above

table, however, shows a fair average which can be applied to the Island as a whole for the purpose of calculation.

It will be noted from the above that the larger percentage of families have incomes approximating \$16.00 to \$30.00 per month. It is obvious, therefore, that these families could not pay rentals exceeding \$4.00 to \$6.00 per month per family. However, this still leaves approximately twenty-five percent of the families within an income producing group of less than \$16.00 per month. Any solution of their problem would have to be based upon a housing program where rentals would not exceed \$2.00 per month per family. Furthermore, arrangements would have to be made with the municipal authorities to provide water, light and possibly gas at a very reduced figure or free of charge, since at the present time most of the families living in these areas do not pay for such services.

TYPE OF BUILDING PROGRAM REQUIRED

Obviously low cost must dominate any housing program to clear slums in Puerto Rico. At the same time experience has shown that it is a waste of money to build cheap wooden houses in most parts of the Island. The Insular Government is at the present time building a number of wooden houses on partly reclaimed land at "Tres Talleres" in Santurce, where they are moving families from the "Miranda" slum. Such a project can hardly be justified, since without question the new settlement will become another slum area within a few years. Photographs Nos. 1 and 2 show the proximity of this settlement to the sea, making it a marshy area that is overflowed at each high tide. Photograph No. 3 shows the method used to place "Steps" on the bottom of the foundations of these houses to prevent them from sinking in the mud. It is

obvious that it is impossible to build a substantial house under such conditions and that sanitary conveniences are out of the question.

A more serious problem arises from the fact that by this project the Insular Government is "legalizing" a new slum area. At the present time the squatters living in the existing slum areas are at least subject to removal if existing sanitary regulations were enforced. However, the Government is now building an area which, within a few years, will not meet its own regulations and is giving legal sanction to people to live under slum conditions.

The principal argument against building wooden houses, however, lies chiefly in the fact that the high cost of maintenance and the effect of termites, not to mention their inability to withstand hurricanes, make their building but a transitory improvement.

Photographs Nos. 4 and 5 show a number of houses built by the Puerto Rico Emergency Relief Administration (PRERA) in 1934 and 1935. Within a few years these houses have deteriorated to a degree that makes their ultimate life but a matter of a few more years.

Photograph No. 6 shows wooden houses built by the Red Cross at Arecibo following the hurricane of 1952. Already they constitute a new slum in that municipality.

In San Juan, very near the "Miranda" slum, the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration constructed an apartment house known locally as the "Palansterio". (Photograph No. 7) This project is a series of adjoining apartments of reenforced concrete built to withstand hurricanes, earthquakes and fires, with a capacity for 316 families. The structure is three stories high with an interior patio. Each apartment has two bedrooms, kitchen,

shower bath and a large combined living and dining room. In the center of the patio there is a community building in which has been established a kindergarten and rest room for under-nourished children, a small library and club room. This apartment house was built at a cost of \$657,000, not including the land which was transferred to the Administration by the Insular Government. Rentals range from \$2.00 to \$4.25 weekly per family, depending upon the location of the apartments, as follows:
